## Complaint against BOE filed with accrediting agency

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A complaint has been filed with a school accrediting agency concerning the Gilmer County school system's potential violation of organization's accreditation standards.

"The complaint alleges violations in the area of governance and leadership. The complaint alleges inappropriate behavior of a board member," reads a letter dated Feb. 3 from the AdvancED school accrediting agency to

the local school system. "Specifically, the allegations include violations of board policy by interfering in the district's day-to-day operations, state open meeting laws regarding the dismissal of the former superintendent (Bryan Dorsey) and possible violations relating to a breach of confidentiality regarding an employee's health records."

The possible infractions are against Accreditation Standard 2, which deals with governance and leadership.

"They're just allegations at this point,"

emphasized Dr. Mike Bryans, state director for AdvancED Georgia during a Times-Courier interview.

He went on to explain that the previously referenced letter was sent to the school system as part of AdvancED's standard protocol for

## 4 candidates qualify for BOC seats so far

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Four candidates qualified for two open positions on the Gilmer County Board of Commission, but none for two available positions on the school board, as of last Tuesday.

Danny Hall and Charlie Paris both qualified for the BOC chairman's post, while Mayra Torres and Joe Waldrop qualified for the Post 2 position being vacated by Hall at the end of the year.

Official qualifying ends Friday at noon in the Probate Court office.

The qualifying fee for commission chairman is

\$1,957.86, and for Post 2 chairman the fee is \$195.79 (3 percent of respective salaries). The fee for school board is \$43.50.

Mark Simmons announced he was running for the chairman position but had not filed qualifying official papers by last Tuesday.

No one has qualified or announced intention to run for the non-partisan Post 4 and Post 5 school board seats now held by Michael Bramlett and Gary Hyde. Neither has indicated they will seek re-election.

The primary election will be conducted May
